Wildmoor Quarry Expansion

In early January, Wildmoor Quarry requested a Scoping Opinion with regard their intention to extend existing mineral extraction, to quarry adjacent land and to import inert material.

Responses to the Scoping request have been given by FVCA, the Parish Council, District Councillor May and others.

The Community Association, at the February Social Saturday Gathering held on 5th February, gave a presentation outlining the proposal as detailed in the Wildmoor Quarry's Scoping Request, plus images taken by FVCA to help residents understand what could be happening. The presentation slides can be viewed on the FVCA website.

On the opposite page, satellite image showing the current quarry site and a map of the proposed extension that the applicant is considering.

At present, there is not a full planning application and so there is currently no consultation. The purpose of this presentation is to make residents aware of what could be happening, and should a full planning application be submitted that they have the information to make an informed decision as to whether they wish to support or oppose the planning application.

It is the intention of FVCA to hold a meeting once the full planning application has been published, and FVCA will request an extension to the consultation deadline.



Karen Swan has been described as an enigma. Her distinctive sweeping vocal style and haunting insightful songs transport the listener to her creative wonderland.



Ali & Ava (15) - Sunday 10th April 7.30pm

Both lonely for different reasons, ALI and AVA meet through their shared affection for SOFIA (6), the child of ALI's Slovakian tenants, whom AVA teaches. ALI finds comfort in AVA's warmth and kindness and AVA finds ALI's complexity and



humour irresistible. Over a lunar month, sparks fly and a deep connection begins to grow. However, the legacy of AVA's past relationship and ALI's emotional turmoil at the breakdown of his marriage begins to overshadow their newfound passion.

Enveloped in music and imbued with humour, ALI AND AVA is a compelling contemporary love story written & directed by BAFTA-nominated Clio Barnard (The Arbor, The Selfish Giant, Dark River).

Dear Evan Hansen (12A) - Wednesday 20th April 7.30pm



Film adaptation of the Tony and Grammy Award-winning musical by Steven Levenson. Evan Hansen, a young man beset by social-anxiety disorder, is ordered by his therapist to write self-addressed motivational letters to himself in order to

improve his disposition and communication skills. After one of these missives is stolen by a classmate who subsequently takes his own life, the deceased's parents believe it to be a genuine note intended for Evan, who ingratiates himself with the family. As this relationship deepens, he begins to truly understand what it means to belong.

Junior Flicks: Clifford The Big Red Dog (PG) - Thursday 21st April 11.00am

When Emily Elizabeth wishes that her tiny, red puppy named Clifford will grow to be big and strong, she never anticipated waking up to find a twelve-foot pup in her small New York apartment. In an effort to keep him, Emily sets out to locate a magical



animal caretaker she hopes can restore her pup to his normal size. As she searches the city with her irresponsible uncle Casey, schoolmate Owen and Clifford the big red dog, word of Clifford's size attracts the attention of a scientist who wishes to claim him as his own.

The Father (12) - Wednesday 27th April 2.15pm

Academy Award and BAFTA Award-winner THE FATHER is a tremendously



powerful story about a man who begins to question the fabric of his reality. With powerhouse performances from Anthony Hopkins and Olivia Colman, Florian Zeller's uniquely made feature film debut is disorientating and intriguing, and must be seen to be believed.

The 355 (12A) - Sunday 8th May 7.30pm

When a top-secret weapon falls into mercenary hands, wild-card CIA agent Mason "Mace" Brown (Jessica Chastain) joins forces with rival German agent Marie (Diane Kruger), former MI6 ally and cutting-edge computer specialist Khadijah



(Lupita Nyong'o), and skilled Colombian psychologist Graciela (Penélope Cruz) on a lethal mission to retrieve it. The unlikely team must also stay one step ahead of a mysterious woman, Lin Mi Sheng (Bingbing Fan), who is tracking their every move as the action rockets across the globe.

Wildfire (15) - Wednesday 18th May 7.30pm



Inseparable sisters raised in a small town on the Irish border, Lauren and Kelly's lives were shattered with the mysterious death of their mother. Left to pick up the pieces after her sister abruptly disappeared, Lauren is suddenly

confronted with the family's dark and traumatic past when Kelly returns home after being reported missing for a whole year. With the intense sisterhood reignited, Kelly's desire to unearth their history is not welcomed by all in the small town, as rumours and malice spread like wildfire, threatening to push them over the edge.

Cyrano (12A) - Wednesday 25th May 2.15pm

Award-winning director Joe Wright envelops moviegoers in a symphony of emotions with music, romance, and beauty in Cyrano, re-imagining the timeless tale of a heartbreaking love triangle. The film tells the story of a



poet who struggles to reveal his true feelings to the woman he loves due to his perceived unattractive appearance.



The Italian city of Turin been chosen as the Host City of the 66th Eurovision Song Contest, having triumphed over 16 other competing bids.

Italy won the right to stage next year's event when Måneskin gave their country its first win since 1990 with the song Zitti e Buoni at last year's contest, which was held in Rotterdam.

The Grand Final of the Eurovision Song Contest 2022 will take place at the PalaOlimpico, one of Italy's largest indoor arenas, on Saturday 14 May, and the them for this year's contest is The Sound of Beauty.

St. Mark's Day

Our village church was named to honour St. Mark the Evangelist, whose feast day is on 25th April.

Mark was an Evangelist—one of the four men who wrote the Gospels found in the New Testament. Mark's Gospel was written first, and it is the shortest description of Jesus' life, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension. Mark's writings helped both Matthew and Luke to write their Gospels.

Mark was not one of the original Apostles, and he probably never knew Jesus. Instead, it is believed that he was a member of the first Christian community. In his writings, St. Peter refers to Mark as his "son." Peter may have used this term to show his love for Mark, or he may have used it because he was the one who baptized Mark. It is believed that Peter was the primary source for Mark's Gospel.

Mark travelled with Sts. Paul and Barnabas to spread the Good News about Jesus. During his imprisonment in Rome, Paul mentions Mark's concern for him and writes about how helpful Mark is in the ministry of helping others to believe in Jesus (Colossians. 4:10; 2 Timothy 4:11).

Mark founded the Church in Egypt and he became bishop of Alexandria, an important centre of trade and power during ancient times. He died there sometime between the years 68-74 AD as a martyr for his belief in Jesus.

Mark's Gospel is a lasting treasure for all believers. He wrote his Gospel to help people know that Jesus was the Son of God who suffered and died to save us from sin and death. When we read Mark's Gospel, we learn that to be a follower of Jesus, we, too, must be willing to make sacrifices, to "take up our cross and follow" (Mark 8:34) Jesus as he asks us to do.

The symbol for Mark is a lion with wings. That is because his Gospel begins with the story of John the Baptist, a "voice crying in the wilderness" (Mark 1:3), like the roaring of a lion. Lions are called the kings of the jungle. Mark's Gospel

tells us about Jesus' royalty as God's Son, a kingship we share through our Baptism.

We celebrate Saint Mark's feast day on April 25 and he is patron of Notaries, Venice, Barristers. His life and Gospel remind us to share the Good News about Jesus with others.




