Suspected Sighting of Giant Hogweed

At the Parish Council meeting that was held on Monday 3rd July, Fairfield Village Community Association became aware that a plant believed to be Giant Hogweed had been sighted in Dark Lane, Belbroughton.

Although the suspected plant is outside the Association's benefit area, residents and visitors may wish to be made aware of the potential dangers of the Giant Hogweed plant should they be walking in the area that the suspected plant is growing or should further plants be found in or near our benefit area.

Giant Hogweed is part of the carrot family and is common on riverbanks and wasteland. The plant, a close relative of cow parsley, has white flowers, thick bristly stems and can grow more than 16ft (5m) tall. Native to Central Asia, it was introduced into Britain in 1893 as an ornamental plant but "escaped from domestication".

Toxic components in the leaves, stems, roots, flowers and seeds can be transferred to skin by touch. These do not cause burning alone - but they make skin sensitive to sunlight, which can then cause rashes, burns and severe blistering. These effects may not start straight away - often appearing 24-48 hours after exposure.

The Centre for Ecology and Hydrology says severe blistering can "recur for many years". It says Giant Hogweed "causes damage to DNA", adding: "Contact with the cut material in sunlight produces a reaction in almost everyone. The degree of symptoms will vary between individuals, but children are known to be particularly sensitive."

The NHS says "If the sap of the plant comes into contact with your skin, it can cause severe, painful burns and make your skin sensitive to strong sunlight.

What to do: If you touch a giant hogweed, cover the affected area and wash it with soap and water. The blisters heal very slowly and can develop into phytophotodermatitis, a type of skin rash which flares up in sunlight. If you feel unwell after contact with giant hogweed, speak to your doctor."

A Giant Hogweed plant can produce up to 50,000 seeds per year, and it is important to stop it seeding – **Special Protective clothing should be worn when dealing with the plant.**

If you spot the plant that you believe to be Giant Hogweed notify the landowner and the Parish Council. If the suspected plant is in Fairfield or Stoneybridge please also notify Fairfield Village Community Association.

Appearance

Giant hogweed (Heracleum mantegazzianum), is a tall, cow parsley-like plant with thick bristly stems that are often purple-blotched.

The flowers are white and held in umbels, (flat-topped clusters, like those of carrots or cow parsley), with all the flowers in the umbel facing upwards. The flower heads can be as large as 60cm (2ft) across. It can reach a height of 3.5m (11.5ft) or more and has a spread of about 1-2m (3.5-7ft).

Giant hogweed is usually biennial, forming a rosette of jagged, lobed leaves in the first year before sending up a flower spike in the second year and then setting seed. True biennials only live for two years, dying after flowering, but giant hogweed does not always behave as a true biennial and in fact some are perennial, coming up year after year.

Control

Although there is no statutory obligation for landowners to eliminate giant hogweed, local authorities will often take action to remove infestations in public areas. Plants that are undesirable, out-compete desired plants, or simply invade half the garden are classed as weeds and require control. Weeds from abroad with strongly invasive tendencies are termed 'invasive aliens' and pose a severe threat to wild or other uncultivated environments, such as railway embankments.

Because of the severity of the threat, legislation has been applied to invasive aliens, including giant hogweed. The Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended) lists it on Schedule 9, Section 14 meaning it is an offence to cause giant hogweed to grow in the wild in England and Wales (similar legislation applies in Scotland and Northern Ireland). Also it can be the subject of Anti-Social Behaviour Orders where occupiers of giant hogweed infested ground can be required to remove the weed or face penalties.

Local Authorities have powers under certain circumstances to require giant hogweed to be removed.

Neighbourhood Watch News

Elderly Fairfield Resident Scammed

During June, an elderly resident fell for a scam operated by a young man with dark hair, driving a large white van. The man was polite, 5' 10" – 6' tall and tanned.

Having undertaken some working on the garden, which he received payment for, the man offered to do some work on the roof. Saying that he did not have the money



for materials he asked the resident for £60.00. Not having the full amount, the resident gave the man £40.00. The man has not returned. The incident has been reported to the police.

Fraudsters contact victims claiming to be from HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC)

At the beginning of August, an elderly Bromsgrove resident received telephone calls from a male and a female who said they were from HMRC and payment should be made by buying ITunes vouchers. The victim did this and also provided the voucher numbers. A further call has then been received again today telling the victim that they needed to purchase further ITunes vouchers.

Action Fraud have previously warned where fraudsters contact victims claiming to be from HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) and trick them into paying bogus debts and taxes using iTunes gift cards.

Victims are contacted in a variety of methods by fraudsters claiming to be from HMRC and are told they owe an outstanding debt. Fraudsters all ask for payment in iTunes gift card voucher codes. Fraudsters use iTunes gift cards to collect money from victims because they can be easily redeemed and easily

sold on. The scammers don?t need the physical card to redeem the value and instead get victims to read out the serial code on the back over the phone.

How to protect yourself:

- HMRC will never use texts to tell you about a tax rebate or penalty or ever ask for payment in this way.
- Telephone numbers and text messages can easily be spoofed. You should never trust the number you see on your telephones display.

Operation SmartWater Community

72 dwellings signed up to Operation SmartWater Community, well below the 75% minimum threshold. Residents present at the FVCA meeting on Saturday 1st July were disappointed and thanked all the volunteers that stood outside the Village Hall on the day of the General Election promoting SmartWater and for delivering reminder flyers.



After considering that Operation SmartWater Community had already had two extensions to the deadline, that the shortfall in reaching the minimum threshold is approximately 150 properties, it was reluctantly agreed to write to all residents that had returned pledges explaining why we will not be proceeding with Operation SmartWater Community, returning any money paid. Residents will be advised that they can purchase SmartWater kits as individuals, at the reduced promotional one-off price of £25 inclusive of VAT and delivery (usually sold on an annual membership basis at £59.99 per year).
