Wildmoor Quarry

At the time of writing, we understand that the owners of Wildmoor Quarry still wish to expand their operations, which could see the quarry expand closer the village, towards Swan Lane and the properties opposite the Swan Inn. It is understood that it is being claimed by Mr. Parton, who owns the quarry, that Cadnet have no objections to mineral extraction either side of their pipeline.

• the proposed combined application area would be approximately 27.93 hectares of land for mineral extraction.





It is currently envisaged that the planning application will be submitted to the County Council by the end of this year. Once the planning application is published, we will use our communication channels to notify residents. We encourage residents to respond to this planning application.

In January 2022, Wildmoor Quarry requested a Scoping Opinion with regard their intentions. In that request, the applicant proposed:

- continuation of existing activities at the site;
- extend phased quarrying activities on land to the west and south west measuring approximately 11.29 hectares;
- to extract approximately 2.6 million tonnes of sand over a 13 year period, equating to approximately 200,000 tonnes per annum;
- the phased restoration of the site utilising both in-situ material and approximately 3,220,000 tonnes of inert restoration material, equating to approximately 210,000 tonnes per annum over approximately 15 years and 3 months;
- to include a material recycling facility (MRF) to recover approximately 1,071,000 tonnes of recycled materials from the imported Construction, Demolition & Excavation (CD&E) materials, equating to approximately 70,000 tonnes per annum.

Introducing the "8 Hills" Regional Park

The National Trust is working on proposals for the creation of a 12,000 hectare (47 square mile) 'regional park', centred along the 8 Hills between Clent and Weatheroak in North Worcestershire.

Bromsgrove District Council are being encouraged, by heritage & wildlife groups, and other stakeholders, including Fairfield Village Community Association, to include 8 Hills in their local plan, which is currently being reviewed. BDC are now actively considering 8 Hills for inclusion and are engaged in the development of a spatial framework looking at opportunities.

The overall vision for the 8 Hills Regional Park is to improve access to the countryside for local communities, create additional income opportunities for farmers, and improve wildlife corridors and heritage features. The regional park would help to ensure that any development doesn't reduce or cut off access to the countryside for local communities.

Bonfires

With warming weather, many people are out tending to their gardens, hanging washing on the line and leaving windows open around the house for ventilation.

Smoke from garden bonfires can prevent your neighbours from enjoying their garden, opening windows or hanging washing out and can be an irritant for those people that have health conditions, such as asthma.

Is that bonfire necessary?

Householders are therefore urged to consider an alternative method of disposing of garden waste e.g. composting, which can provide a useful soil enricher for your own garden. Compost heaps/bins also provide a home for many insects, voles and even slow worms. You can also put garden waste in the District Council's Brown Wheelie Bin that is collected fortnightly or you can take waste to the Romsley Recycling Centre.



How to prevent smoke nuisance

If it is essential to burn material in the open air, please follow the advice below:

- Light your fire when your neighbours are not likely to be in their gardens, having windows open for ventilations or washing on their line. Speak to your neighbours and liaise with them.
- All material to be burnt should be as clean and dry as possible.
- Bonfires should be sited as far as possible away from any houses.
- Check the wind direction to prevent smoke from being blown into your neighbours' property or onto roads.
- Never burn plastics, oil, rubber, electrical components or other chemicals as these materials produce toxic and offensive fumes.
- All bonfires should be closely supervised, since they are potentially dangerous. Do not leave a fire smouldering – put it out using soil or water.

What do I do if my neighbour is regularly having bonfires and I think it is a nuisance?

The Looped Hole Walls of Fairfield

Have you ever wondered why there are holes in the wall, on both sides of the road, at the junction of Bournheath Road and Stourbridge Road?

They are known as Loop Holes.

Loop Holes were cut into garden walls during World War 2 to allow weapons to be fired through them, by the local Home Guard unit, in event of an enemy invasion.



According to the Defence of Worcestershire Project (1996), these structures are now quite rare in Worcestershire.

During World War 2, the Church Hall (on the site of what is now the Village Hall) was used by the Fairfield Platoon of the 2nd Worcestershire (Bromsgrove) Battalion Home Guard as their Headquarters and the Hall was also requisitioned for use as a first aid point.



Fire Crews Respond To Fallen Horse

Fire Crews from Bromsgrove Fire Station and Large Animal Team from Bromyard Fire Station were called on Saturday 22nd April to assist George a 25 year old cob horse, who measures more than 15 hands and weighs about 550kg, that had fallen in a building, off Money Lane, and unable to get up.

A vet from Field Equine Vets had been called by the owner's and was in attendance when they decided to call fire control and request assistance.


By the time the first crew arrived George had already been given some sedation to keep George calm , using specialist equipment that the crew carry on the fire appliance for animal rescue, a plan was put in place to get George out of the building, then with the support of a local farmer and his tractor.

George was lifted to his feet after a short time he was able to stand on his own and the straps were removed.

George was given a full check over by the vet and given a clean bill of health, and is out now enjoying the grass.

A showstopper pork pie for the Village Picnic



Recipe courtesy of Miranda Gore Browne - Miranda is a food writer, home-baking expert, director of The Kitchen School and passionate foodie.

Ingredients

- 600g shoulder of British pork (300g whizzed in food processor or mincer, 300g finely chopped)
- 150g smoked streaky bacon
- 80g of breadcrumbs
- Fresh herbs I used sage, marjoram, thyme and some chives
- 1 Bramley apple, peeled, cored and finely chopped
- 1 tsp of coriander seeds, crushed
- 1 tsp of juniper berries, crushed
- ½ tsp of white pepper
- ½ tsp of nutmeg
- · A good pinch of mace
- Freshly ground salt and pepper
- 1 organic chicken stock cube
- 6 leaves of gelatine or 1 x 12g sachet
- 1 pint of boiling water

For the pastry:

- 450g plain flour
- 450g strong white flour
- 2 teaspoons of salt

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180 degrees
- First prepare the filling. Use a pestle and mortar to crush the herbs and spices. Put into a large bowl with all of the other ingredients, cover with foil and put to one side while you make the pastry.
- 3. To make the pastry, weigh and sift the flours and salt into a large mixing bowl.

- 300g lard
- 440ml water
- 1 egg, beaten, to brush on top

- 4. Put the water and lard into a pan and bring to the boil. As soon as it has boiled, remove from the heat.
- 5. Pour the hot lard and water into the dry ingredients and use a wooden spoon to mix together. Keep mixing and then put your hands in to knead in the last dry bits. The pastry should be warm and elastic, like playdough.
- 6. Take a large (7-inch minimum) deep and loose-bottomed cake tin. Break off about two thirds of the pastry and roll into a rough ball.
- 7. Put this ball into the bottom of the cake tin.
- 8. Use a glass, bottle or rolling pin to press down into the middle of the dough. Then use your hands and fingers to press and pull up the dough to make the base and sides of the pie. The pastry should cover all of the inside of the tin and overlap at the top it will hang over a little. The pastry should be at least 1cm thick, patch any bits if the pastry has broken or torn.
- 9. Stand the lined tin on a flat baking tray. Spoon the filling into the pastry case.
- 10. Then take the remaining pastry and use a rolling pin to roll out a circle a little larger than the base of the tin. Dip your finger into a little water and run it around the pastry where it meets the top of the tin. Carefully lift on the circle of pastry and press and crimp to connect the pieces. Trim off any excess with a pair of kitchen scissors.
- 11. Make two holes in the top with a sharp skewer they need to be big enough to pour the liquid jelly through once cooked.
- 12. Decorate the top with rolled out pieces of pastry (eg a Union flag as I've done) or leave plain. Use a little water to stick on any decorations.
- 13. Put into the preheated oven to bake for 2½ hours, remove from the oven and brush the top with some beaten egg, return to the oven to go golden this will take about 20-25 minutes. Make sure it doesn't burn by checking regularly.
- 14. Take it out of the oven and let it cool at room temperature for about an hour before adding the liquid jelly.
- 15. Sprinkle the gelatine powder or melt the leaves according to the packet instructions. Then mix a stock cube in boiling water and pour into the gelatine. Make up to a pint with boiling water. Use a funnel or a jug to pour into the holes (you may need to reopen the holes with a skewer, if they have closed up while in the oven). Leave to cool and for the jelly to set for a couple of hours in the fridge.

Car Key Burglary

Message from: PCSOSimon Cadwallader

Over the past few months, West Mercia Police have been investigating a number of reported car key burglaries in the Bromsgrove area and we want to reassure the community we are doing all that we can to trace those responsible.

Car Key Burglary is a crime where an individual breaks into a home with the specific aim of removing car keys and stealing a car from that property.

Perpetrators of this crime often 'work to order' and will target specific vehicles, based on demand and value. If a criminal is targeting a certain vehicle they will also be targeting the owner, looking for easy ways to exploit their security and get to their keys.

"The most common methods used by thieves are to follow victims' home or 'cruise' around residential areas looking for opportunities. If you think you are being followed or see any suspicious vehicles, take the registration number and report it to the police."

You can also reduce your chances of becoming a victim of car key burglars with the following simple crime prevention methods which are the most effective way to deter potential thieves:



- · always keep your keys somewhere safe and out of sight
- always lock your car away safely in the garage, if you have one
- fit a high quality alarm to your vehicle use additional security systems such immobilisers and visible security locks
- always take your keys with you when leaving the vehicle unattended
- always keep your keys safe and concealed in public places
- make sure doors, windows, the boot and sunroof are secure whenever you leave your vehicle
- if you own more than one vehicle, park the lesser valued vehicle behind the more expensive one on the driveway, making it more difficult to remove

It is also important to remember to protect your home:

- make sure all windows and doors are securely locked
- · install a high quality burglar alarm
- install an exterior security lighting system


Summer security

We are urging people to particularly vigilant to burglaries as the warm weather arrives. During the summer months, doors and windows are often left open, making homes an easy target for thieves.

There are some simple but effective ways that you can protect your property:



- Keep front, patio and back doors closed and locked when you are elsewhere in the house or the garden.
- Keep garden gates locked when you are away from the property.
- Ensure that windows and external doors on the ground floor are locked at night, and all doors and windows are locked when you are out of the house. Even a small window could provide a burglar with an opportunity to reach through and open a larger window to gain access.
- Remember to close downstairs windows when leaving a room, to deter the opportunist thief.



- Register your property for free on https://www.immobilise.com/ it helps the police identify the owners of recovered property. You can register anything that has a serial number with Immobilise.
- Look out for your neighbours' property if they are away for a few days.
- Joining our Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. Our Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator
 works with the local Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team to help keep you informed
 of criminal activity in our area, pass on crime prevention advice and help resolve
 local issues. Local members are encouraged to keep an eye on what's going and pass

YET ANOTHER WHATSAPP SCAM!

We have shared various scams where fraudsters have used WhatsApp as the platform to catch out the unsuspecting victim. Probably the most common one in recent months has been the "Hi Mum/Dad I've lost my phone and need some money to buy a new one"

However please be aware of the latest reported WhatsApp scam which is the

WHATSAPP ACCOUNT TAKEOVER

How does it work?

The scam begins with the criminal accessing another WhatsApp account which you have listed as a contact. The criminal posing as your friend or a member of a WhatsApp group you belong to, will then send you a seemingly normal message to try and start a conversation with you.

However, at about the same time, you receive a text message from WhatsApp with a six-digit code. This is because the criminal has been trying to log in to WhatsApp using your mobile phone number.

The criminal then claims they sent you the code by mistake and asks you to help by forwarding the code to them.

Once they have the code they can log into your WhatsApp account and lock you out. They can also then use your contact list to steal more accounts and use them to perpetrate further frauds.

How to protect yourself.

- · Set up to-step verification to give your account more protection. Tap Settings / Account / Two-step verification/ Enable
- · STOP THINK –CALL if a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person to confirm their identity
- · Never share your account's activation code the 6 digit code received by SMS

· You can report spam messages or block senders within WhatsApp. Press and hold the message bubble, select "Report" and follow the instructions

Online Sales Scams

There has been a new twist to the methods used by fraudsters purchasing from their victims on line.

Basically the victim has placed an item on Marketplace and receives a message from a "purchaser" online who says he will visit the seller to pay, and collect the item.

On arrival he shows the victim a "Banking App" on his phone and asks the victim to put their banking details on it to receive the payment.

Once completed, the phone screen confirms that the transfer has been completed, and the suspect leaves with the goods, but no money has been received.

As ever, always be vigilant to new scams and use conventional, recognised methods of payment.

Other scam emails that are circulating at the moment and you should be aware of:

- TV licence this email tells you that your Direct Debit payment has failed and asks you to reenter your banking details. It may look authentic but always check the email address it comes from and check your TV Licence account first via the recognised address, to find out if your payments are up to date
- BT Email this message tells you that their Server System has failed and has quarantined your email messages. It provides a clickable link t "Review Messages" to release them never click the link. This email looks amateurish and as before comes from a fake Hotmail address
- ICloud storage You are told that your cloud storage is full up and you need to purchase more storage space. The offer of "Cheap Storage" may be tempting and the message may carry some authentic logos, but the email address of the sender will look suspicious so do not click the link provided. Check your authentic ICloud account to find out first if there is any problem with your storage
- Santander Quite an authentic looking email with Santander logos and content copied in, and telling you that "PAYM" is closing.. However once again the fake email address of the sender is obvious. Do not click on the "My Details" link it requests you to use to update your details.

Planning a holiday? Here are some top tips to avoid scams:

Remember to "TakeFive" before parting with your hard-earned cash, as some deals that are advertised online may not be all they seem.

Stay ahead of the criminals by following our tips:

- Read online reviews from reputable sources to check websites are genuine.
- Only use the secure payment method recommended by reputable
- online retailers.
- If possible, use a credit card when making purchases over £100 and up to £30,000 as you receive protection under Section 75 of the Consumer Credit Act.

If you have visited a website you think is suspicious you can report it to the National Cyber Security Centre using the 'report a suspicious website' form on their website.

Take Five To Stop Fraud...

- Stop: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.
- Challenge: Could it be fake? It's okay to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only
 criminals will try to rush or panic you.
- Protect: If you think you've been a victim of fraud, contact your bank immediately
 and report it to Action Fraud online at <u>actionfraud.police.uk</u> or by calling 0300 123
 2040.
