

Fantastic Rollout To Date

Check your Council Tax bill, this will tell you which Parish you are in. Which Polling Station do you go to, to vote? If Fairfield Village Hall, you live in the Fairfield Ward.

Fairfield Remembers

The service was led by Rosie Padmore (ALM), the Ode of Remembrance & the Kohima Epitaph was read by John Jenkinson (villager).

Operation Lollipop

Members of the public in Bromsgrove, Rubery, Alvechurch, Wythall and Hagley are now able to send digital photographs of dangerous or inconsiderate parking outside schools directly to their Safer Neighbourhood Teams via a dedicated email address -

<u>OperationLollipop@westmercia.pnn.police.uk</u> Officers will then investigate and make contact with the registered keeper to take appropriate action where possible.

Parking advice if you live near a school

West Mercia Police would like to let you know what the parking rules are and how we can help to keep the highway clear and ensure the area is safe for pedestrians (especially children), cyclists and drivers.

Parking rules

The road outside your house is usually defined as a 'public highway'. Therefore anyone can legitimately park there but should do so safely, considerately and legally. The introduction of the Traffic Management Act 2004 places a statutory duty on your council to tackle congestion and disruption on the road network.

Your local authority manages the highway network in a manner that allows for some "on street parking". In areas where parking becomes problematic the authority has the power to introduce restrictions to control the highway use.

Therefore, this means, the highways' sole purpose is for the free passing and free flowing of vehicles and the areas close to your home are not for your exclusive use to park.

Frequently asked questions

What can be done about people parking on single or double lines or keep clear markings?

If there are road markings, such as single or double yellow lines, both parking and waiting to pick up school children are restricted.

Responsibility for enforcing these restrictions lies with the Civil Enforcement Officer, employed by Bromsgrove District Council. West Mercia Police cannot enforce these restrictions.

School 'keep clear' markings should always be kept clear of all traffic. Please let your Civil Enforcement Officer know if you see a vehicle regularly parking on them.

What can be done if someone blocks my driveway?

If your driveway is completely blocked by a vehicle, the offence of 'obstruction' could be considered. However, obstruction is a complicated offence to prosecute.

It is not enough that a vehicle blocks your driveway. The obstruction has to be 'actual' not 'perceived'. This means that you are actually obstructed at that moment by that vehicle because your immediate passage is blocked. It's not enough that you might want to use your driveway some time in the future.

A police officer is the only one who can deal with an obstruction. PCSOs do not have legal powers to deal with this issue. You have to be willing to make an official complaint, maybe a statement of evidence and even go to court if the person getting the ticket decides to contest it.

Dropped crossings can be enforced by the Civil Enforcement Officers.

When and who to call

When a vehicle is blocking your driveway and you are unable to get in and out of your own property, please call West Mercia Police on 101.

Your local council Civil Enforcement Officers would like to hear from you if vehicles have been left unattended on single or double yellow lines.

Members of the public can submit (via a secure online form -https://www.nextbase.com/en-gb/national-dash-cam-safety-portal/) digital footage showing potential traffic offences. This can range from driving dangerously or carelessly to overtaking on solid white lines, using a mobile phone while driving, ignoring traffic lights or dangerous driving around other road users, such as horse riders and cyclists. Your submission will be sent to West Mercia Police where the evidence will be reviewed by one of their road traffic officers, who will enforce against any offences committed. Any footage submitted through the portal can also be used by the Police to help educate other road users and to advise on case results.

Dog Mess


Signs are been placed around the Recreation Ground to remind dog walkers to clear up any mess.


Stay ahead of the chill this Winter

Neighbourhood Watch News

Have you got CCTV?

Please regularly check your CCTV footage, you might spot suspicious activity that may be a preparation for an illegal activity.

Scam Alerts – Our Community Is Not Immune

If you get a telephone call from someone offering home security with an alarm that links you to the police, put the phone down, dial 1471 to get their number and report to the police, tel 101. A resident in the village has received one such call....it was a SCAM.

Another resident received a cold call from "Community Safety Group" to arrange a home visit to discuss home security improvements. Fortunately, this resident was clued up and asked the right questions and did not agree to an appointment. The call has been reported to the police.

And a third resident has received an email on several occasions claim their PC was infected with a virus and demanding money. Luckily, our resident was not fooled and has not carried out the instructions. There was no virus within the computer. Should you receive a similar email, do not respond to it, do not click any links contained within and delete it.

Please pop round to your elderly and vulnerable neighbours, speak to them about scams and ask them to remain vigilant.

Phone Scams

The police take phone scams very seriously. Criminals will often use scam phone calls as a way of defrauding people out of their money. On most occasions, people realise that the call is a scam, but we are encouraging people to continue be vigilant.



What to look out for:

Typically scammers will pretend to be from the police, and tell callers that their bank cards have been used fraudulently. Often the callers have stated that they are from the West Midlands police, but they have been known to claim that they are from West Mercia Police, MI6 or the fraud squad. They will often say that they have the offenders in custody.

Usually they will then ask the victim to contact their bank to cancel their cards. In doing so, they will 'hold the line', so the victim believes that they are calling their bank, when in fact they are still on the line to the offenders.

They will then encourage the victims to hand over their bank details, including their PIN which they will often ask them to enter into the keypad of the phone.

Following this they will say that the cards are needed and send a courier to collect them. Sometimes they will ask the victims to give a password which the courier will use to make it appear more genuine. Consequently the offenders have been able to withdraw money from victim's accounts.

On other occasions, rather than sending a courier, they have asked the victims to transfer money to a secure police account, asking them to call back to verify that they are genuine, whilst holding the line.

Sometimes the scammers have told the victims to attend the bank to transfer money but told them that bank employees are involved in the scam, so not to mention it to them.

More recently callers have told victims that they are from Customs and Excise and that they have paid too much tax. In order to get this back they must pay an amount of money via a courier.

These scammers will often target those who are elderly or vulnerable. People with common surnames such as Jones or Smith tend to be targeted more often.

What to do:

We offer the following advice to protect you from these scams:

- Remember police officers, and banks will never ask for account details or PINs over the phone.
- Police officers and banks would never come to your house to collect your cards or property.
- They would also never ask you to transfer money to a secure account.
- If you receive a call like this, hang up immediately and call 101 using another phone. In an emergency or if a crime is in progress call 999.
- If you have elderly friends or relatives who may be vulnerable to this scam, please talk to them and make them aware.

Online Extortion Scam - Alert from Action Fraud

Cyber criminals send victims their own passwords in extortion scam Cyber criminals are attempting to blackmail unsuspecting victims by claiming to have used the victims' password to install spying malware on the victims' computer. The criminals claim they've recorded videos of the victim watching adult material by activating their webcam when they visit these websites. What makes this scam so convincing is that the email usually includes a genuine password the victim has used for one of their online accounts. We believe criminals obtain the passwords from data breaches.

What to do if you get one of these emails?

Don't reply to the email, or be pressured into paying. The police advise that you do not pay criminals. Try flagging the email as spam/junk if you receive it multiple times. Perform a password reset as soon as possible on any accounts where you've used the password mentioned in the email. Always use a strong, separate password for important accounts, such as your email. Where available, enable two-factor authentication (2FA). Always install the latest software and app updates. Install, or enable, anti-virus software on your laptops and computers and keep it updated.

If you receive one of these emails, report it to Action Fraud's phishing reporting tool. If you have received one of these emails and paid the ransom, report it to your local police force.



Number Plate Thefts

West Mercia Police have recently experienced a number of thefts of vehicle number plates. This type of theft is a common crime.

Criminal will often use stolen vehicle number plates (also known as VRM's - Vehicle Registration Mark plates) and then attach them to their own or even previously stolen vehicles in order to help them commit additional crimes and evade identification and capture by the police.

Please consider replacing your number plate screws with "clutch head" screws which will prevent criminals from unscrewing your number plates and stealing them. If your vehicle does not utilise screws in order to fasten the VRM plate to your vehicle you may be more likely to become the victim of this type of crime as these types of VRM's are often only secured by double sided sticky tabs and can be removed relatively easily. In these instances please consider seeking suitable technical assistance from a professional in order to find an alternative method of securing your registration plates to your vehicle.

Not Sure? Don't Open The Door!

Protect yourself from doorstep crime. Be aware of people who turn up unannounced, most genuine callers will have a pre-arranged appointment. If in doubt, keep them out!

Doorstep crime can include rogue traders offering home improvement or gardening services, or bogus callers who claim to be the council, police, health carers or energy companies.

Rogue traders may say they are in the area working on another property and they have spotted a problem with your home or garden. They may claim to have materials left over from another job, like paving or tarmac. They may try to pressurise you to buy goods or sign up for services on the spot. Unfortunately all too often they may offer to carry out work cheaply , but charge an extortionate price after the work has been completed.

Bogus callers may claim to be working for the council, water, gas or electric company. They could also say they are a nurse, doctor or even from the police. Bogus callers may say they need to come into your home, or try to get you to go outside. They may try to distract you so they can steal your money. They can be male, female or even children.

A pedlar is someone who calls at your door to sell items that they have to offer, This can often include cleaning or household goods. These goods may

be sold at an overpriced value. By law pedlars are required to carry a pedlar's certificate, which is issues by the police force in the area they operate.

If you are not sure who is at the door, do not open it. Check the identity of any caller. Confirm who they are by calling the company they work for by using the number from the telephone directory or from off one of your bills. Do not call a number provided by them.

If caller does not leave your property when asked to do so, call the police.



against doorstep scams

- 1. Never use cold-callers.
- 2. Consumers are legally entitled to a 14-day cooling off period formed at their home.
- 3. Check the identity of the caller.
- 4. Encourage people to ask a trusted person for advice on reputable traders.
- 5. Everyone should display a "No Cold Calling" sticker.
- 6. Always report suspicious activity.

Take A Few Simple Steps To Avoid Becoming A Victim Of Burglary

- · Set a timer switch to turn your lights on when it gets dark - unlit houses are a give away that no one is at home.
- Lock your doors, patios and downstairs windows - even when you are in. Make sure you double check them again before you go to bed.
- If you have a burglar alarm, make - sure you set it when you got out and also when you go to bed.

- Don't leave car keys, ID cards or valuables near windows, doors or letterboxes, where burglars can reach through to steal them.
- Lock your garden gates and side entrances. Don't leave tools lying around in the garden which could be used to break in to your home.
