

Everybody will be facing a change in their circumstances this Winter as the cost of living is set to increase.



- Prioritise essential household bills like rent, mortgage, Council Tax, gas & electricity above credit cards & loans - let creditors know you are struggling.
- If you can't keep on top of gas & electricity payments, please continue to pay what you can & talk to your supplier.

PLEASE LOOK AFTER YOUR HEDGES

As I am sure you will all agree, Belbroughton and Fairfield are wonderful places to live, and the Parish Council would like to keep it that way for all our parishioners.

As bird nesting season is now over and it might be the time of year but in various locations around the parishes there are examples where hedges or shrubs have grown so much, they are breaking beyond garden boundaries and overhanging pavements and walkways.

In some cases, pedestrians are made to step into the road to navigate around them. This is not safe and is especially hazardous to wheelchair users and to those people with pushchairs or prams and small children.

Could we kindly ask that you look at the front of your property/fields and where necessary give all those hedges and shrubs a trim. Not only will this improve the appearance of your villages, but it will help to ensure the safety of your neighbours.

Emily The Little Match Girl (U) – 27th December 11.00am



Young Children to be accompanied by an adult

Based on the classic Hans Christian Andersen Fairytale 'The Little Match Girl', with the voices of David Bradley (Hot Fuzz and Harry Potter) & Lesley Joseph (Birds of a Feather and Night & Day)

After the sudden death of her Grandmother,

Emily is taken to the local match factory by the towns corrupt Constable. Here, Harry 'The match maker' and his wife Mary, exploit the children to sell their matches in exchange for lodgings and a warm meal.

On Christmas Eve, Emily struggles to sell enough matches to keep Harry and Mary happy; and what money she has made is lost in a drain. Deciding to stay out, to avoid any punishment, Emily strikes a match to keep warm. The matches take her on a magical journey, eventually reuniting her with her Grandmother.

In the meantime, Emily's new friend Anna decides to leave the match factory in the middle of the night in search of Emily. On her journey she teams up with Richard, a well-to-do young gentleman who has ambitions to help the children after learning of their treatment.

Will Harry and Mary get away with their business endeavour and will the other children be saved? All will be revealed in 'Emily, the little match girl'

This film was screened during the October half-term break, the audience thought that the storyline, animation, music & songs were brilliant.

The Railway Children Return (PG) – 28th December 2.30pm

Inspired by one of the most beloved British family films of all time, RAILWAY CHILDREN is an enchanting, moving, and heart-warming adventure for a new generation. 1944 — As life in Britain's cities becomes increasingly perilous, three evacuee children — Lily (Beau Gadsdon), Pattie (Eden Hamilton) and Ted (Zac Cudby) Watts — are sent by their mother from Salford to the Yorkshire village of Oakworth. There to meet them on the train station platform are Bobbie



Waterbury (Jenny Agutter, reprising her iconic role in the original film), her daughter, Annie (Sheridan Smith), and grandson Thomas (Austin Haynes), and with their help the evacuees are soon settling into their new life in the countryside. When the children discover injured American soldier Abe (KJ Aikens), hiding out in the railyard at Oakworth Station, they are thrust into a dangerous quest to assist their new friend who, like them, is a long way from home.

DC League of Super-Pets (PG) – 29th December 11.00am



Reclusive author Loretta Sage writes about In "DC League of Super-Pets," Krypto the Super-Dog and Superman are inseparable best friends, sharing the same superpowers and fighting crime in Metropolis side by side. When Superman and the rest of the Justice League are kidnapped, Krypto must convince a rag-tag

shelter pack—Ace the hound, PB the potbellied pig, Merton the turtle and Chip the squirrel—to master their own newfound powers and help him rescue the superheroes.

Where The Crawdads Sing (15) - 18th January 7.30pm.



From the best-selling novel comes a captivating mystery. For years, rumors of the "Marsh Girl" haunted Barkley Cove, isolating the sharp and resilient Kya from her community. Christmas with Katy Rose Bennet & David Freja

Saturday 3rd December 8.00pm

Katy Rose Bennett has been writing and performing her idiosyncratic brand of folk for over 20 years. October 2020 saw the release of her 6th solo album: 'Where Does It Hurt? An Introduction to Katy Rose Bennett'.

There was a time in the early 2000s when Katy Rose Bennett (or KTB as she used to be known) was on the cusp of breaking through: she had been a finalist in the BBC Young Folk Award, she had performed on the main stage at Truck Festival with a 16-piece band and she had been invited to play at SXSW Festival in Austin, Texas on the back of the critical success of her quirky debut album, All Calm In Dreamland.

But then, aged 20, it all went a bit sideways – Katy's mental health suddenly declined with the start of a cycle of brief manic episodes followed by seemingly endless months of silent depression, which continued for several years. All while she was theoretically studying for a music degree.

During these turbulent years, Katy wrote and recorded her second album, the aptly titled 'Bluebird' receiving glowing reviews, performing across the UK and again almost reaching that next level of success. However, her fragile mental health continued to hamper her career and confidence. She says of that time:

"One thing I remember so clearly was that, even though I could sometimes barely string a sentence together, I could still perform and sing every word of my songs."

And what of those songs? Brought up on Patsy Cline, k d lang, The Beatles and whatever else her dad or older brothers were listening to, Katy began crafting her own particular brand of folk

song in her early teens. She writes at the piano or guitar or a cappella and has a fondness for multi-layered vocals and jazz-infused harmonies.

After finishing her degree, and with her mental health improving, she continued to write, perform and record, releasing (with little fanfare) the rich and varied Indelible Ink in 2009. Resigned to the thought that musical success comes in your youth or not at all, Katy decided to turn her attentions elsewhere — she got married (well, civil-partnered), trained as a music therapist, got a proper job, started running community choirs, bought a house and became a parent. Songwriting and gigging became a hobby. On occasional weekends, over two years, Katy and her brother and long-time collaborator Joe Bennett (of Goldrush and Dreaming Spires) recorded a 4th album, the joyful and tender Songs of The River Rea (2016) inspired by life alongside Birmingham's hidden river. Katy self-released the album — it got a few good reviews. And that was the end of that.

Except it wasn't. A year later, Katy's life imploded with the sudden onset of a bizarre and little understood condition, Functional Neurological Disorder. In Katy's case, it caused her legs to stop functioning properly for significant periods of time, causing her to be often unable to walk. It changed everything. Katy quit her job as a music therapist and she found herself living with a friend for a peppercorn rent in a dilapidated, Victorian park keeper's lodge in the centre of Birmingham.

"It was a strange time. In some ways the hardest period of my life, and yet also one of the most musically fruitful. I must have written nearly fifty songs in the year I lived there."

With some of those songs, Katy released her 5th solo album, the raw and emotional 'The Meantime' in 2019, recorded live and mostly in first takes in Bristol with her friend Jim Cornick of Ersatz. What Katy realised was that, for her, writing songs and being a creative artist are not occasional hobbies.

"They are my reasons for being and my purpose in life. Connecting people through song is what I live for!"

Alongside the release of the new album, which comprises of songs from Katy's considerable back catalogue and one new song, Katy will be releasing three singles and touring the UK. She will also be working with theatre-maker Francesca Millican-Slater to develop a music, song, story-telling and spoken word solo piece about her and others' experiences of Functional Neurological Disorder.



Supporting Katy Rose Bennett will be David Freja, singer/songwriter with deep meaningful words at the heart of the melody. Influenced by Neil Young, Radiohead, Nick Drake, Nick Crave, Portishead, Sigur Ros and forward this to contemporary to being inspired by what's new, inventive & sometimes obscure.

If a vehicle/person feels out of place please report to the Police as suspicious activity, tel. 101. Even if something seems trivial to you, it's worth reporting as it could be important/vital information. Please remain vigilant at all times, and not just during anyone incident.

Protect yourself from doorstep crime. Follow our advice to reduce the risk of being scammed.

Always be aware of people who turn up unannounced. Most genuine callers will have a prearranged appointment.

Doorstep crime can include rogue traders offering home improvement or gardening services, or bogus callers who claim to be the council, police, health carers or energy companies.

Rogue traders may: say they are in the area and have spotted a problem with your home or garden; claim to have materials left over from another job, like paving or tarmac; try to pressurise you to buy goods or sign up for services on the spot; offer to drive you to a bank so you can withdraw money to pay them; provide false names, addresses or telephone numbers.



Shed Security

Many people don't secure their shed or garage in the same way they do their homes - often using an easy-to-break lock or padlock to protect valuable contents such as a car, bike or lawnmower.

An opportunistic burglar will try a shed or garage first because they can find the tools they need to break into the main house.

Shed and outbuilding security: first steps

First off, check that your insurance covers the contents of your shed or outbuildings from theft.

Think like a thief

Take a look at your shed and consider how you would break in. It's worth having a good padlock on the door with no exposed screws. Pay attention to hinges, as these are sometimes easily removable. If you have windows then these could be vulnerable unless they're secured with wire mesh or grills. And keep it locked at all times.

Alarm it

Consider a battery-operated shed alarm. They look low key but they respond to movement or door contact with an extremely loud siren.

Lock it. hide it or mark it

Don't give them the opportunity or the tools to commit a crime. Lock everything away securely. Tools can be locked inside a locker or box or secured with a chain.

Secure your bike to the ground or a lockable stand within a locked shed or garage. Visit <u>Sold Secure</u> to search for ground anchors and other locks designed to fix to floors and walls. It's always worth draping an old sheet or blanket over the top of mowers or bikes to keep them covered from view.

Although it might sound like stating the obvious, never leave your garage or shed door unlocked if you're not around.

Property marking your items is advisable and some tools can be painted with your name or postcode. Forensic marking is also an option.

The top five most common items stolen from sheds

- Bikes
- Mowers
- Sports equipment
- Power tools
- Garden tools

Premium Rate Telephone Number Scam

What is it?

Scammers will try to trap people trying to search the internet for Government Services and other providers. e.g. DVLC They will show an advert with the phone number of the service, or department that the person is looking for, and these may appear high on a search engine lists as an "Advert".

However this will come with a heavy charge as a Premium Rate Call, often up to £30 per call.

Even if you do finally get through to the right department, you have paid an unwarranted high charge.

Remember, most of these Advice Lines should be free of charge.

What to watch out for.

- · Always avoid using numbers prefixed with 084, 090, 091,or 098, no Government Department will use such numbers
- · Take care when searching for such things as Car Tax and Driving Licence renewals, as well as HMRC enquiries and returns.

And finally, when looking for Government Department contact details, always us the official Government Services Website – GOV.UK

Energy Bill Rebate Scheme Scam

Several recent Warnings have been issued about possible scams as this scheme comes into play. However it worth remembering the following points about this Scheme to avoid being trapped by the Fraudster's texts and emails which are already circulating.

- Direct Debit customers will receive the Energy Bill discount automatically as a deduction to the monthly Direct Debit amount collected, or as a refund to the customer's bank account following Direct Debit collection during each month of delivery
- · Standard credit customers and payment card customers will see the Energy Bill discount automatically applied as a credit to standard credit customers' accounts in the first week of each month of EBSS delivery, with the credit appearing as it would if the customer had made a payment
- Smart prepayment meter customers will see the Energy Bill discount credited directly to their smart prepayment meters in the first week of each month of delivery

- · Traditional prepayment meter customers will be provided with redeemable EBSS Energy Bill discount vouchers or Special Action Messages (SAMs) from the first week of each month, issued via SMS text, email or post. Customers will need to redeem these at their usual top-up point
- · Customers will NOT need to apply via any government link, website, rebate company, share-scheme; nor will they need to provide their bank account details or make contact with their energy supplier


