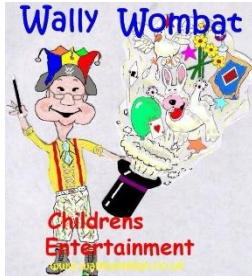

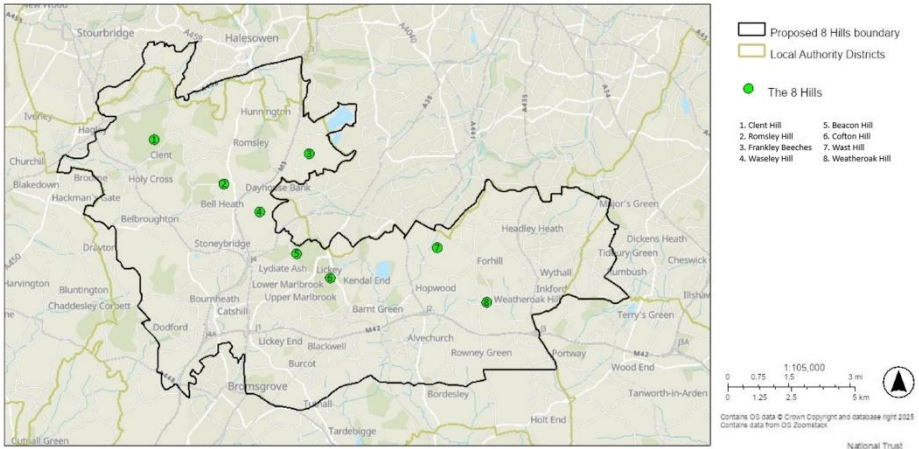

8 Hills Regional Park Update

Following consultation with neighbouring local authorities, there is now a new proposed boundary for 8 Hills. This revised area includes parts of Dudley, Birmingham and Solihull, covering approximately 58 square miles.

The project to establish the 8 Hills Regional Park is being led by the National Trust, with the support of various stakeholders, including Fairfield Village Community Association, representing Fairfield, Wildmoor & Stoneybridge.

As part of the project a pipeline of footpaths are being created and we would like to hear your suggestions, email chair@fvca.org.uk. It is hoped, working with local landowners, permissive footpaths can be created, with the landowner receiving a Payment for Access, funded by Cotswold Outdoors; landowners being fairly compensated based on the number of people using the path, ensuring that both the community and the landowner benefit from improved access to nature.

As an active partner in ReNEW, the Cultural Compact for North East Worcestershire, the Community Association looks forward to collaborative working with the 8 Hills community and local creatives to develop a cultural identity for the 8 Hills Regional Park which celebrates local people's connectedness to the landscape. This will inform the production of a public art gateway that will act as the first physical marker for access to the regional park. Once further information is known we look forward to people in our community being part of this initiative.

What is Suspicious Activity?

If a vehicle/person feels out of place please report to the Police as suspicious activity, tel. 101. Even if something seems trivial to you, it's worth reporting as it could be important/vital information. Please remain vigilant at all times, and not just during anyone incident.

News In Brief

- Local Policing team are aiming to get to Foodie Fairfield (not May 2026), 10.00am – 10.45am. Residents are encouraged to meet the team and to raise any issues with them, or seek crime prevention advice. The team are also popping into the Bournheath Coffee Morning on the 3rd Wednesday of each month.
- Since the start of the year there have been two incidents of burglary/attempted burglary in Fairfield village.
- During the Easter school break, youngsters entered private land, causing vandalism, including lighting a fire. Please remind your children about not entering private land and not lighting fires.
- Fly-tipping continues to be an issue, especially on Malthouse Lane.
- Vigilance is needed regarding livestock thefts and worrying.

Keeping Older Persons Safe Online

Whilst the world of the Internet offers great opportunities for young and old alike, it also presents many risks. A recent crime survey stated that more than a fifth of respondents aged 65 years and over had been a victim of fraud in the last year.

Older victims of fraud may also become more secretive about what has happened, because of the feelings of shame and guilt they have through falling to the fraudsters.

So why not sit down and have a chat with older family members, friends, or neighbours about staying safe online, on the phone and even on the doorstep?

Talk to them about the types of Fraud to watch out for, and how they can protect themselves.

TYPES OF FRAUD

As technology becomes more sophisticated, so do the techniques used by criminals and this has been exacerbated by the development of Artificial intelligence – A.I.

They now use a wide variety of methods to trick people, the most frequent are listed below:

IMPERSONATION FRAUD

Criminals are experts at impersonating trusted organisations, including banks, the police, and government departments such as HMRC and DVLC, to convince you to make a payment, or share your personal and financial detail.

INVESTMENT FRAUD

There are numerous paid adverts or comparison sites claiming to be legitimate firms offering guaranteed returns with minimal risk. You may be asked to complete a "Contact Form" with your personal details for a Call-Back.

The use of genuine company logos, celebrity endorsements and testimonials may often be fake.

PURCHASE FRAUD

It can be easy to fall for a purchase scam. Criminals advertise goods/services at "too good to be true" prices often via social media or auction sites to trick people into purchasing something that does not exist. They often use images taken from genuine sellers to convince you they are the real deal. They may also ask for payment prior to delivery and send fake receipts and invoices that seem to be from the payment provider.

Where possible pay by Credit Card which offers you a level of protection in reclaiming payments if things go wrong.

ROMANCE FRAUD

The ease of online dating services often means you can find the love of your life in the comfort of your own home. However, this also provides criminals with an opportunity to gain your trust and build a relationship with you by using information and fake identities found on social media – also known as catfishing. Criminals will claim to declare strong feelings for you just after a few conversations before pretending to need money for a personal emergency or flights to visit you.

So be wary about the type of personal information you add to your social media profile, as criminals can “harvest” those details to create a compatible profile online which makes you feel safe to engage with them.

COURIER FRAUD

If you’re contacted by someone purporting to be from your bank or the police, take a moment to question their authenticity. If the caller is from the bank, they may claim that their system has spotted a fraudulent payment on your card or that it is due to expire and needs to be replaced.

They may even confirm personal details about you, such as your full name and address and offer you peace of mind by having someone such as a courier collect your card to save you from having to go to your bank or local police station. You may even be asked to write down your PIN and place it in a separate envelope to that of your card. **Banks will never ask you for personal details over the phone.**

DOORSTEP FRAUD

Doorstep criminals can come in all sorts of disguises, from dodgy salesmen to unscrupulous tradespeople and, can be very convincing. They may claim to have noticed something about your property that needs work or improvement, such as the roof, and offer to fix it for a price which rapidly increases as the job progresses with payment required upfront. Some criminals may even convince you to visit your bank branch to withdraw money whilst they set up their equipment. **Always request a written quotation on headed notepaper and never make upfront payments.**

HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST FRAUD

If you receive a request to provide personal or financial information whether that’s over the phone, in an email, online or through social media always remember:

- Criminals are experts at impersonating people, organisations, and the police. They spend hours researching you for their fraudulent schemes, hoping you will let your guard down for just a moment.
- Stop and think for 5 minutes - It could protect you and your money.
- If you are unsure, then talk to a trusted relative or friend
- Avoid making payments by Bitcoins or Gift Cards if asked

Mobile Phone Thefts

Criminals used to steal mobile phones for the value of selling the handsets on to anyone who was willing to pay. However nowadays they are much more likely to be stolen for the value of the contents, and the access they can get to your personal and financial information, and so we see a rise in mobile phone thefts.

For example, many users have their Banking Apps or banking card details in a “Wallet” on the phone, and if they are not securely protected then the criminal has a rich source of information to use and can empty your bank account very quickly. Also remember never to keep any physical bank cards with your mobile phone.

Criminals often work in groups with one person distracting the victim, whilst another person tries to observe the passcode being entered and a third person may then actually steal the phone. The criminals often take advantage of the victims late at night, when venues are closing, and the victims may not be so alert to their surroundings.

So how can you protect yourself?

- Never leave your phone. iPad or Tablet unattended, out of your sight or visible on a table in a public place
- Make sure your phone is not visibly protruding from your pocket where the opportunist can grab it.
- Never handover your phone to anyone you do not know, who may ask to “borrow” your phone to call a taxi for example.
- Be aware of your surroundings and only use your phone if it is safe to do so; in public places try and keep your back to a wall when using the phone, so no one can come behind you and grab the phone.
- Watch out for anyone behind you on public transport “shoulder surfing” to discover your PIN. Use of stronger passwords make it more difficult to “shoulder surf”.
- On busy city streets watch out for anyone on bikes or mopeds following you
- When you have finished using it, make sure you put it away, out of sight.
- Never store Passwords on your phone

Further steps to take in case your phone is stolen.

- Secure your phone by making best use of its security features with a strong PIN, Passcode or Password which can stop anyone using it if stolen.

- Get your IMEI number which is unique to your phone and can help to locate it if lost or stolen – dial *#06# on your keypad then keep a note of it in a secure place.
- Use a Tracking app – you can set this up on your phone so you can then see where it is quickly from your laptop or other device.
- Turn off message previews so thieves will not be able see any messages with reset or login codes when your phone is locked.
- Contact your bank as soon as possible to prevent any transactions being made from your stolen phone

Take Five to Stop Fraud

STOP: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

CHALLENGE: Could it be fake? It's OK to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

PROTECT: Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud

ALWAYS REMEMBER:

- Avoid disclosing security details
- Emails, Phone Calls and Texts may not be authentic
- Always make direct contact with any organisation by using a genuine phone number
- Stop and Challenge any unexpected requests
- Protect others by reporting Fraud and Scams

How You Can Help Stop Fraud

- **If you've fallen for a scam, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or via actionfraud.police.uk**
- **Scam Text messages can be forwarded to 7726** to help phone providers take early action and block numbers that generate spam on their networks.
- **You can also report Scam mobile calls by texting 7726 with the word "Call" followed by the scam caller's phone number.**
- **Forward Fake Emails received to report@phishing.gov.uk**
- **If you think your bank account or personal banking details have been used fraudulently, then use the short phone number - 159 - to contact the Fraud Prevention Department of most major UK banks.**

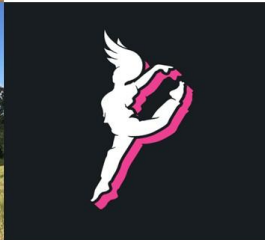
